All abstracts should be from 3 to 5 pages long, without references and formula. Ideally, they should describe: the substantive problem and the data analyzed (if any), as well as the approach and models used. They should also include a clear statement of the main results and conclusions and the most important key references.

All submissions, except invited talks, will be evaluated by the organizers, and applicants will be informed about their acceptance to the workshop.
